

WHAT'S IN A NAME? By Glenda McIntosh

Subfamily: Epidendroideae

Tribe: Maxillarieae
Subtribe: Zygopetalinae
Genus: Bollea Rchb.f.
Species: coelestis Rchb.f.

Pronunciation: BOL - ee - ah see - LES - tis

Etymology: This genus was named in honor of Dr. Carl Boll, a German patron of horticulture, who lived during the 19th century. The species name, from the Latin *coelestis*, means sky-blue describ-

ing the color. **Synonyms:** Zygopetalum coeleste (Rchb.f.) Rchb.f.; Bollea pulvi-

naris Rchb.f.

Taxonomy: H. G. Reichenbach described this genus in 1852 in the *Botanische Zeitung*. It is easily identifiable by the hooded column which protrudes over the large circular callus and the lip being firmly attached to the column foot. It is closely allied to Pescatorea, Chodrorhyncha and Huntleya and, indeed, they all resemble each other. *Bollea coelestis* is closely related to *Bollea violacea* (Lindl.) Rchb.f., which differs in having a violet flower with a purple callus, a narrower apex to the lip and narrower sepals and petals.

Distribution: There are perhaps eleven species in this genus and all are native to Brazil, Colombia, and Ecuador. *Bollea coelestis* grows in Southwestern Ecuador and in Colombia. It has not been reported from the intervening territory between the two locations of El Oro, Ecuador, and the area near Cali in the Cordillera Occidental of Colombia.


Plant description: This is a tufted epiphytic plant without pseudobulbs. Leaves 6-10 per growth, oblong-lanceolate, acuminate, 15-30 cm L, 3-5 cm W. Inflorescence several at one time, suberect to nodding, shorter than the leaves, with a small sheathing bract at each node, I-flowered. Flowers 7.5-12 cm across, showy; sepals and petals bluish-violet, paler at margins and base, yellowish at the apices; lip bluish-violet with a buff-yellow crest; column bluish-violet above, yellow in front, spotted red towards the base. Dorsal sepal broadly ovate, curved forward, 4.5 cm L, 2 cm W; lateral sepals ovate-oblong. Petals similar to dorsal sepal, spreading. Lip with a large semicircular crest occupying the basal three-quarters, deeply grooved longitudinally into numerous rounded ridges, 2.5 cm L; lamina ovate, with recurved margins and apex. Column broad, arching, convex, hairy towards the base, 2.3 cm L.

Bloom season: Summer.
