Minicattleyas - Not New



Ron Midgett began growing orchids in 1969 in the orchid-rich environment of Southern California. Since then, he has grown orchids in many different regions of the US and in the Caribbean for 3 years. Currently, he resides in Santa Fe, New Mexico. He is a breeder with an emphasis on

Cattleyas, Paphiopedilums, and Oncidinae. Several cultivars from his crosses have received AOS awards.

In 1990, Ron founded the New England Orchid Company in Franklin, MA. In 2003, he moved his orchid business to New Jersey and in 2010, to Santa Fe, NM and changed the name to New Earth Orchid Co.

In addition to Ron's activities in the orchid business, he has been active in the local orchid societies. This includes serving as an officer, chairing orchid shows, and running the New England Orchid Fair for 3 years.

Ron is an accredited AOS judge currently serving in

the Rocky Mountain Region. He has served as chairperson for AOS judging for the 2011 and 2012 New Mexico Orchid Guild Shows. In 2011, Ron was invited to participate in judging the Taiwan International Orchid Show.

Ron has authored articles published in Orchids and most recently in the Orchid Digest. He was given the prestigious Ernest Heatherington award from the Orchid Digest for his article, "Beyond Sc. Beaufort—A 20 Year Odyssey in Cattleya Breeding". Ron feels a special honor in receiving this award because Ernest was one of his first mentors.

You'll be getting this newsletter about the time of the Tyler, TX show. Emily Quinn and Linda Horton will be making our display for that show. Maybe some of you would like take a trip to Tyler! There are other shows coming up soon also: Houston has its show April 20-21, Austin is the next weekend, and Oklahoma City is

coming on Mother's Day weekend. So pace yourself!

We are close to the time of year when many orchids can begin to be put outside. The last average date of possible frost is March 15 (though I've also seen dates for Dallas that extend to April 8). In our climate, cymbidiums and nobile-type dendrobiums can spend most of the winter outside. They tolerate evening temperatures down into the 40's. Many houseplants can go outside now. When nighttime temperatures reach the mid 50's and higher (like we'll be having soon), dendrobiums and cattleyas can go out. The warm-growing genera, like vandas, bulbophylums and phaleanopsis, appreciate having temperatures no lower than 60°. Remember though – orchids are like people in at least one way. They need time to adjust to sun or they will burn. Start with your plants in heavy shade for a few days and slowly increase the sun exposure, so they can adjust. For other genera, do some searching on the internet and find out the lowest temperature tolerance before putting your orchid outside.

Our next show will be about a year from now. We are beginning to look at possible locations for it. Once we have a location, we'll be able to set a date. In the meantime, keep growing!

- As an aphrodisiac
- For any number of physical ailments, from toothache to stomach problems
- Against witchcraft

Nancy Cropp announced the results of judging for the plant table, and Linda Horton conducted the plant raffle. Lorna Kissling adjourned the meeting at 4:46 p.m.

Waling-Waling

Vanda sanderiana (syn. Euanthe sanderiana) is commonly called Waling-Waling in the Philippines, where it originates. Waling-Waling is a term used by the Bagobo people of the area, referring to the movement of a butterfly or moth in flight. The Bagobo also rever the Waling-Waling as a "diwata" (a benevolent spirit said to reside in large trees, and invoked for crop growth, health, and fortune).

V. sanderiana is native to Mindanao, the second-largest and southernmost island in the Philippines. It was discovered by Carl Roebellin, an explorer for the orchid house of Sander. In 1882 it was named Vanda Sanderiana in honor of Frederick Sander. In the 1950s, due to over collecting and habitat destruction, it became rare and expensive. However, in 1982 at the Asian Orchid Congress, it caught the eye of a young orchid grower named Charita Puentespina, who took up its cause. By 1986, Puentespina was able to sell to the public hundreds of healthy seedlings. Today the Waling-Waling, although rare in nature, can be found in gardens throughout the Philippines.

V. sanderiana is also sometimes referred to as "The Queen of Orchids," due to its importance in breeding. It is estimated that up to 80% of all hybrid vandas include sanderiana. And, in 2013, a bill was passed by the Philippine Senate declaring the Waling-waling as a national flower alongside the Sampaguita.

In addition to the pink form discovered by Roebellin, it also has an alba form. Its flowering season starts July to September, although there are plants that flower twice a year, blooming in January to March as well.

SOCIETY HISTORY

The GNTOS was formed in 1954 as a result of the joining of the Dallas Orchid Society and the North Texas Orchid Society. The new organization was formed as a nucleus for a larger an potentially greater Society with an enthusiastic membership. On March 19, 1954, we were issued a charter by the AOS as the Greater North Texas Orchid Society
