


NEXT MEETING IS JULY $_{7}$

ORCHID OF THE MONTH







Phragmipedium besseae

Phragmipedium besseae is a terrestrial orchid native to the wet forests on the eastern slope of the Andes in Columbia, Ecuador and Peru. It was found in Peru in 1981 by Elizabeth Besse, who was leading a botanical expedition for the Marie Selby Botanical Gardens. A single herbarium specimen and pickled flower sent back were initially mis-identified as Phrag. schlimii, but soon it was determined that this was a new species, and it was described as such by Cal Dodson.

Besse's expedition collected about 20 plants, of which most remained at the Selby gardens. However, several were sold at auction for \$1700 each. Prior to the discovery of besseae in 1981, the other known phrag species typically produced blooms in soft, subdued colors. Therefore, the intense red of besseae caused quite a stir among breeders, and more plants were brought out of Peru. Mastering besseae culture took some time; however, a number of growers began growing the species, and became more successful over time.

Much of the beauty of modern line-bred besseae derives from a single plant, the Posada clone. Terry Root (of the Orchid Zone) had a friend who visited Juan Felipe Posada, an orchid grower from Colombia. Mr. Posada had an outstanding wild-collected besseae that was far superior to anything else he'd seen, and he took pollen back to Mr. Root. A couple of years later, the first-generation plants from Posada crosses produced exceptional plants, including 'Colossal', 'Big Bob', and 'Big Boy'. The best of these F1

were crossed and the best of those successive crosses were bred forward.

Besseae has dull green leaves, 13–30 cm long, and 2–5 cm wide. It produces 1-6 flowers opening sequentially, on a spike up to 50 cm long. It does not tolerate high temperatures well, requires moderate to bright light, and must have very pure water quality to thrive. There is also a yellow variety (besseae var flavum; it is typically considered harder to grow.
